How have you grown closer to God? How have you grown in holiness? Give thanks to God for accompanying you in this season.</p>	<p>April 4</p> <p>Say a prayer for all the elect, who are waiting to be baptized into the Church on Holy Saturday.</p>	<p>April 5</p> <p>Lent officially ends tomorrow as the Mass of the Lord’s Supper begins. Try to participate in the moving liturgies of the Triduum in your parish.</p>	<p>April 6</p> <p><b>Holy Thursday</b></p> <p>“For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the death of the Lord until he comes.” 1 Corinthians 11:28</p>	<p>April 7</p> <p></p> <p><b>Good Friday</b></p> <p>On this day when we recall the Lord’s Passion, pray the Stations of the Cross (<a href="https://www.usccb.org/prayer-worship/prayers-devotions/stations">https://www.usccb.org/prayer-worship/prayers-devotions/stations</a>) and reflect on Jesus’ love expressed in his saving death.</p>	<p>April 8</p> <p><b>Holy Saturday</b></p> <p>As we await with hope the celebration of the Resurrection, let us keep silent vigil like the women who sat facing Jesus’ tomb (cf. Matthew 27:61)</p>
<p>April 9</p> <p><b>Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord</b></p> <p>“This is the day the LORD has made; let us be glad and rejoice in it.” Psalm 118:24</p>	<p>Dear Brothers and Sisters, Lent is a favourable time for personal and community renewal, as it leads us to the paschal mystery of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. For our Lenten journey in 2022, we will do well to reflect on Saint Paul’s exhortation to the Galatians: “Let us not grow tired of doing good, for in due time we shall reap our harvest, if we do not give up.
